Describe your proposed research question or proposed innovation: What is it you are trying to learn, or what innovation in the way we teach and tutor writing, are you investigating through your research? Remember that our workshop features mentoring, so we are open to research questions *at any stage of development* and/or *any potential proposed innovation*, so feel free to think boldly and broadly. You can hem things in later!

Describe the need your research and/or innovation might fill: In what ways might teaching or tutoring writing be improved—made more effective, more equitable, more engaging for students, more suited to the world students will enter, etc. Try to describe a problem or deficiency, or an area of untapped possibility, in any setting: first-year classrooms, writing centers, local communities, courses for underrepresented or underserved populations, upper division writing, writing in disciplines, in writing majors, etc.
What research methods might you use to answer your research question and/or to pilot and assess your innovation? If your research is already in progress, describe the method of study and your work thus far. If not in progress yet, just tell us about some ways you might systematically research this topic. If you are proposing an innovation in the ways we teach and tutor writing, you might describe how that innovation could be tested (as a pilot version) and assessed
(for further iterations based on what you find). If you're early in your research, just describe your best instincts—it's our job to help you develop the methods further.
